There have been a good variety of events at the hall recently, including a wedding reception, so we are delighted that our efforts to improve the hall are seeing benefits for ourselves and the wider community. The restored floor, toilet upgrade and new chairs are certainly helping! We are focused on trying to get a grant to repair the roof now that we finally have three quotes. Fingers crossed.

The EMH committee has worked tirelessly over the past 9 months to understand and maximise the potential of the solar PV system which was installed in 2022. We have learnt a lot and had some expert help and are now in a position to report that the system is working to its full potential and bringing great benefit to the hall, especially during these sunny summer months. The next step is to get a new bidirectional electricity meter installed in order to sell back any excess energy (a proper smart meter is not feasible due to the poor signal locally, as we know!!).

Local and Regional Weather Report

June is the month of the longest day at the summer solstice (June 21st) and also mid-summer day on St John's day (June 24th). The weather lore for St. John's day says that if it rains on this day the hazel and walnut will be scarce; corn smitten, but apples, pears, and plums will not be hurt. Also, if you cut your thistles before St. John, then you'll have two instead of one. Rain in June seems to be hot topic for weather lore so, if it rains on the feast of St. Medard (June 8th), it will rain forty days later, but if it rains on St. Prottis (June 19th), it will rain for the next forty days. Rain on St. Barnabas' Day (June 11th) is good for grapes, but if St. Vitus's Day (June 15th) be rainy weather, then it will rain for thirty days together. June is the month of the cuckoo, but don't hear its song after midsummers day as it brings bad luck.

April started settled and dry with some nights of frost, then continued with a brief period of heavy rain and finished settled, with above average temperatures. More than 6 days out of 10 days saw cloudy weather or rain, but over 8 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather.

Rainfall: Local 52 mm, Regional 83.6 mm = +16% of normal Minimum Temperatures: Local 5 deg, Regional 5.3 deg = +1.7 deg Maximum Temperatures: Local 22 deg, Regional 15.6 deg = +4.2 deg

What is the weather forecast for June? Long range forecasts say starting with showers, but with brighter periods. Then

continuing changeable, with longer spells of both rain and sun. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? There was no mist in May, so do not expect a hot June. The Jetstream forecast at the start of June shows it across the UK with high pressure in the south and winds from the west. This would indicate settled and mild weather, but with the possibility of rain.

Mum knows best!



Working with wildlife presents several challenges and one of those is when, inadvertently a nest is disturbed. It's not always easy if you are taking down a shed and discover a nest with babies such as hedgehogs or mice. But the best thing to do is to stop the work (if you can) and go away for a couple of hours. There is a very strong bond with wildlife and their babies and given half the chance, they will return and move the

youngsters to somewhere safe.

Sometimes the mother is moving the babies and gets interrupted, dropping the baby and running away. We always try reuniting young with their mother after a disturbance, but this is where weather conditions and age of the babies must be considered as this has to be done usually in the dark and can take hours. Natal returns are very difficult as once a mother smells human interference she is naturally wary of the situation.

Secret World Wildlife Rescue was recently called to a house in Bristol where such a disturbance had taken place. The house was having some building works which had allowed a vixen to gain access underneath the floorboards and build a den for her four cubs. The finder was not happy about this and removed three of the cubs from under the house while the vixen was away. With a delivery of cement due



the next day to block up the hole, time was of the essence.

The owners were prepared to let response drivers Emma and Zoe rescue the fourth cub and placed them all in an open carrier on site

that evening, hoping the vixen would appear and move them to a safer place. Then it's a question of staying for a couple of hours to watch what happens. Much to their delight after some time she came along and began picking up the cubs however, much to their frustration, she chose to move them back under the house!

A plan was made to return the next day in the hope the vixen would have moved the cubs elsewhere before the cement arrived.

Just as they were about to leave another fox appeared and started to move the cubs one by one to a safer location. Wildlife Care Supervisor Emma commented 'it was such a relief to see the dog fox appear and move the cubs to a safer place, it took him about 30 minutes in total and then mum followed on after.'

Secret World Wildlife Rescue urges anyone who is about to undertake any form of building work to consider wildlife and check the area beforehand, especially at this time of year when there are so many young around. We can rear orphaned animals, but we will never be able to prepare the youngsters for life in the wild as their own parents could.

"Safer Enmore Road" initiative

Since the start of 2025 we have been thrilled at the support to this initiative and are very grateful to all those who participated in the survey and have given their ideas to making Enmore Road safer for non-motorised users.

We would particularly like to thank members of the Parish Council who have positively responded and given their approval to new road signs to warn drivers about horse riders. We look forward to seeing these signs in place soon. This is especially important as the new Highway Code requires drivers to reduce their speed to a maximum of 10 mph and pass horses at a distance of at least 2 metres.

The Parish Council has also kindly agreed to a budget to purchase large mirrors which will improve visibility for those entering Enmore Road from Frog Lane, Barford Road and Stonehall Lane. The implementation of this is proving more complex than expected but we will keep you updated.

If you would like to provide any further input to our discussions, please contact Tina on steadyedi24@gmail.com and she will raise in our next team meeting. Your support is encouraging us to find new ways to make Enmore Road safer for all.

Finally, if you are riding, cycling or walking along Enmore Road, please do consider wearing hi-viz as it makes you far more visible to car drivers and is safer for everyone.

Weather Forecasting in Medieval Days

Weather forecasts from the 12th century onward, known as "prognostications" were based on genuine scientific beliefs of the time. Medieval forecasters used both detailed observations of actual weather and complex astronomical and mathematical calculations to predict the future.

Arabian scientists from the 9th century believed that celestial bodies, especially the transit of planets in the night sky, exerted powerful forces over the Earth and its inhabitants. The sun brought light and heat, and the moon produced moisture and controlled tides. Saturn was believed to be powerfully dry and cold, while Jupiter was warm and mildly wet. Their work was slowly assimilated by scholars in Europe from the late 11th century and incorporated into university teaching of astronomy by the 13th century. But the main barrier to wider successful forecasting was the complexity of the calculations involved.

An important ¹step was taken in the mid-14th century by a scholar known as John of Saxony, working at the University of Paris. His almanac supplied ready-calculated sets of planetary positions for long periods and was highly influential.

By the 15th century it was already the responsibility of university astronomers, in cities across Europe, to issue annual prognostications covering the weather and with the arrival of print in the late 15th century, such prognostications were rushed out as annual almanacs, which sold in enormous numbers.

¹ This article is taken from work by Professor Anne Lawrence-Mathers and her interesting book "Medieval Meteorology".

Later astronomers, including Brahe and Kepler, continued to build on the medieval weather forecasting models. Brahe argued for making both weather records and forecasts, with the aim of increasing the accuracy of the forecasts by using more data. Weather observations and forecasts made by Kepler from 1593-1624 survive.

Thoughts from Archiving the Village Magazine

Mike Head has undertaken the arduous task of adding to the Somerset Archive over 20 years or more magazines since Bill Ingles took the last tranche. This gave Mike and I (Ed) the opportunity of revisiting the past. How times have changed!

Originally articles were hand-written or typed and then given to named subeditors for the two villages. Their task was to type up the articles into A5 format or sometimes decide that handwritten articles gave more of an authentic local magazine touch. These were then given to the printer who assembled them into the correct order to enable the magazine to be photocopied to produce the magazine.

These were then distributed by volunteers to every household. Then, as now, the whole enterprise was entirely run by volunteers with the printing expenses paid for by the advertisements.

It must be said that it took a while for word-processing and then emailing attachments to become accepted – and a template for the magazine. Now the printers have an easier job as files are produced from which the magazine printer spews out copies - if they are lucky.

Now the magazine can even be accessed on-line from the parish websites . But...the magazine needs volunteers to survive and even more so, it needs articles. Reading some of the earlier magazines, and with no disrespect to current contributors, they were often so much more fun. Where is our sense of humour and our enthusiasm to describe places and activities we enjoy? The delight from reading 'spoof' letters and strange events (see later). Let us be hearing from you readers to prevent the magazine becoming simply a list of events and dates (Ed)

Extracts from the Diary of Gordon Halswell (1874 – 1935). <u>Continued</u>

(To Somerset and Halswell House)

October 30th 1897

St. David Kemeys-Tynte asked me to stay at Sherwood to meet his bride who was a widow, a Mrs Hammond. Sherwood, which is a very peaceful spot is placed in the corner of the park at Halswell. Mrs St. David was very charming. On Sunday we went to Goathurst church about which there is an atmosphere of another age. We sat in the high oak-panelled family pew, all the upper panels of which are painted with armorial bearings. Many hatchments adorn the walls of the church and the funeral helmet and gauntlets of Sir Nicholas Halswell hang above his tomb. His effigy lies beside that of Dame Bridget, their seven children kneeling around them.

I went up to Halswell in the afternoon and Charlie Kemeys-Tynte and I walked over to the Hartwells. Charlie and I went on the club at Bridgwater and then took a hansom back to Halswell – about 5 miles. The next day Charlie wanted me to hunt but I stayed with St. David and spent a very interesting day. He told me something I never knew. When the present Duke of Norfolk was married and he and his wife were returning from the ceremony, she was violently sick. It is not a pleasant story but imagine the feelings of the newly married couple. She must have done her best to hide her indisposition from the crowd which lined the road and this must have made the situation, worse for the poor bridegroom.

It reminded me of a story my grandmother told me of a bride leaving Charing Cross Station with her husband. She was waiving her adieux to a large number of friends and nodding her head. Unfortunately she over nodded it and her teeth fell out upon the platform just as the train moved off, so that the poor bridegroom had to travel to Dover with a "chapfallen" bride.

November 2nd 1897

I went on to stay at Halswell. A Mr and Mrs Thorold were there and Arthur Tynte and his wife. In the evening Dr Kennion, Bishop of Bath and Wells arrived. (There was a large dinner party, at which I believe Halswell Kemeys-Tynte was the only man who was not an old Etonion).

November 5th 1897

I had a great day with the West Somerset. Charlie Tynte sent one of his horses for me to Cannington. We had an excellent day running off and on for five hours with any amount of jumping. Charlie's horse was a great one and at one time there were only five of us up with the hounds. We come to Stoke Courcy brook which thinned out the majority. I heard old Barnes remark to his fat horse "this is no good to us". Helyar, Miss Stanley on a jumping pony, and Miss D'Oyly, on what she acknowledged was a £20 screw and myself were then alone with the hounds but they checked and we unfortunately lost the fox. I rode back most of the way with Miss Stanley who is delightful. The sensation of the day was Mrs Macbeth, the wife of the artist, who rode astride like a man. She wears a frock coat and a kind of divided skirt. Whatever people may say she looks well on a horse and can give many men points with regard to her seat over ordinary fences. It seems to me that if riding astride by women became prevalent, it would only be the very athletic ones who would succeed. The majority of women cannot be made for riding astride and I don't think that they should be.

And more from 1958 - the same student.

The Irish wars of religion were so prolonged because they were fighting for religion. The people were fighting against one another. The wars were going on at a terrible rate because the people were bitter against one another. The wars were going on continually (because they were of sadness).... There were no proper roads or railways....


