Enmore & District Pass Wide and Slow campaign

The British Horse Society (BHS) describes an increasing trend in the number of reported incidents involving horses and vehicles. In 2023, tragically 66 horses and 3 people died, and 94 horse riders were injured on our roads. About 85% of these incidents occurred because a vehicle passed by too closely or quickly.

Sadly, this is all too familiar in Enmore and Goathurst, an issue that is compounded by all to frequent major road closures such as the M5, which see our villages being used as a rat run. Talking to fellow Enmore horse riders, we recognised that although there are some very respectful drivers, too many pass by at speed, overtake on bends or just get too close to us, revving their engines. This is frightening, and we are concerned that a serious incident involving vulnerable road users (including cyclists, and walkers) and a vehicle will occur on our roads.

To help prevent this happening, the Enmore and District Pass Wide and Slow (PWAS) group has formed to share advice, guidance and to educate others to prevent an incident from occurring in our villages. The group welcomes all vulnerable road users, including walkers and cyclists to join us too. Enmore & District PWAS took a conversation to the November Parish Council meeting where we discussed our recent experiences and aspirations. We asked the Council to support improved signage to warn drivers to slow down. The committee suggested we raise awareness of our campaign, to bring about change.

It's important to recognise that there are three brains at work when you pass a horse, the riders, drivers and the horse. Horses are flight animals and can move incredibly quickly if startled. So, as a driver what can you do to help? As of January 2022, the BHS 'Dead Slow' messaging is now incorporated within the Highway Code, including passing semi-feral horses – such as Quantock Ponies. The Highway Code recommends that drivers:

- 1. Slow down to a maximum of 10 MPH
- 2. Be patient don't sound your horn or rev your engine
- 3. When safe to do so, pass wide and slow a cars width and if possible, giving a 2-metre distance
- 4. Drive slowly away.

This November your Parish Council held a normal business meeting on 5th November and

there will also be an extraordinary meeting on Friday 22nd November to discuss the planning appeal made by Enmore Park Golf Club (still in the future at the time of submitting copy for the magazine). In due course the minutes of both these meetings will be available on our website.

As you will be aware, your Councillors take great interest in the issue of speed management within the village, and road safety in general, despite not having powers of enforcement. A potentially dangerous incident affecting a horse rider near the school was reported at the meeting and also to the police. We were delighted that Avon & Somerset Police mounted section (our own Lizzie and a colleague) visited Enmore on Thursday 14 November to make more people aware of road safety issues, and how body-worn cameras can be used to provide evidence. With our narrow roads and lack of footway, vulnerable road users such as pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders should be given a wide (and slow) berth and care should be taken not to spook horses.

Thank you to everyone who took part in the 3 November litter pick or who provided the morale-boosting refreshments afterwards. The appearance of the village is vastly improved without litter - we all benefit from your efforts. In addition, Simon Bowditch should be mentioned in dispatches for carrying out some ditch improvement work, which we hope will channel surface water more efficiently and reduce flooding. Thank you, Simon.

Our next meeting will be held on Tuesday 7th January, and we plan an earlier start to our Parish Council meetings in the dark winter evenings. Agenda and papers will be available on the Meetings page of the website a few days in advance.

In the meantime, all good wishes for a Happy Christmas from your Councillors and their officers: Michael, Fiona, David, Andrew, Graham, Amanda, Debbie and Anne.

Wilder Enmore update!

Spring wildflower bulbs have been planted in the Enmore Churchyard using up the remainder of the Magic Grant.

Enmore School is again taking year groups for a Winter visit to the Churchyard on 6th December, with the support of QLPS, following a successful visit in the Summer.

Bulbs too have been planted around trees bordering the car park at Jubilee Meadow. After a full hedge survey by QLPS, the EPC supported Mill farm to seek a 130m new hedgerow grant which, we are glad to report, was successful.

Something to consider...Defibrillators in Enmore

Following the example set by Goathurst & Broomfield concerning the installation of defibrillators within the parishes I have made enquiries about having more defibrillators in Enmore.

There is already one at the Golf Club available to the public. Now there are grants available to fund half the cost of the defibrillator, installation and connection to an electricity supply are extra.

There are fully funded grants but with a lengthier application process through the BHF. Requires outside wall with access to an electricity supply. Some fundraising may be needed.....

A gift of time

There always seems to be so much organising and worrying about gifts in December. It has so much hype on television, we are made to feel that Christmas has to be all about eating all sorts of food and having

parties in lovely warm houses whereas sometimes the most important gift is your time. It's so easy at this festive season, not to remember to be kind to people who would welcome that visit or telephone call. With nights being so long, people living on their own can sometimes go days without speaking to anyone and I'm sure that there will be less cards being sent now that our post is so expensive.

It's the same with our wildlife as we shall be going into the three months when the weather can be the coldest and food hard to find. A dish of fresh water in your garden daily will save lives. I tend to keep an empty ice cream container by my sink over Christmas and all the cake crumbs, food remnants, crusts and over ripe fruit can be saved and put out for the birds. We don't all have money to buy wild



bird seed and fat balls, and these bits and pieces will be welcome by many. 50% of wildlife usually die within their first year, hunger and cold are the most contributing factors to them not surviving.

We don't always know what happens to our animals when we release them. But we are very lucky sometimes to have bird ringers who will come and put rings on the legs of young birds as they are growing. It means that if these birds are seen by bird watchers, we do get results of where they have been seen including the date. Sadly, we were notified that a Tawny Owl had been found dead in a water trough which wasn't good news, but the records show that the bird was rung on July 26th 2012 when she was 4 month old. She was found in September this year, so she had lived for 12 years which was wonderful news. It just shows that getting animals back in the wild is really worthwhile. I thought you would like to see a selection of casualties that have had that second chance.

Our wonderful staff and volunteers will be giving their time over the Christmas period to make sure that all our casualties will be snug and warm. We shall be open as usual throughout Christmas. So, I'd like to give a huge thank you to each of them for their dedication as well as a great big thank you to all of our supporters that make our work possible.

Message from Sally



As you pass through the Lych Gate at Goathurst Church, you may notice a new tree on the left of the path. We planted this tree last month, in memory of my father, Peter Mayhew, who lived in Goathurst for 35 years. The tree is a Cherry, a Prunus Kanzan. It has double purplish-pink blossoms which will appear during late spring alongside coppery red leaves. The leaves will gradually turn to deep green, then to gold and red in the autumn. A plaque is being made which will be placed by the tree.

When my Mother, Betsey, died in 1991 we planted a horse chestnut tree in her memory. This tree, at the old entrance to the POW camp, is on the right as you go out of the village towards North Petherton. Many of you over the years have mentioned to me that whenever you pass her tree you think of Betsey. I hope the cherry tree for Peter in the churchyard will evoke for you similar feelings and memories. They both so loved living in the village and the two trees stand testament to this. I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank Brenda Smith for all her patient kind support with Peter's tree.

PRESTIGIOUS ROYAL AWARD FOR LOCAL MUSIC VOLUNTEERS



Last month the King's representative in Somerset, the High Sheriff Robert Beckley, awarded one of the highest accolades for voluntary organisations to the volunteers at Music on the Quantocks in recognition of their contribution to "enhancing the life of the community". The award was received by Penny Hooper of Broomfield and Lindsay Osborne of Enmore at a champagne reception

in front of an audience packed with dignitaries including MPs, senior clergy, and all of Somerset's mayors and council leaders. What makes the award so special is that it is given by the High Sheriff without any public nominations. BRIDLEWAY/FOOTPATH UPDATE



Good News for local Riders and Walkers! Straight from the horse's mouth – please pardon the Pun.

Glyn Edwards, Somerset Footpaths Warden, has arranged for contractors to clear Bridlepath BW:15/20 (between the bottom of

Broomfield Hall Road aka "Cruel Hill" and Cobbs Cross Farm) and tells me: "Positive news to report!

I have tackled a real raft of issues along BW 15/20. I have instructed contractors to undertake 3 phases of works –

Phase 1 – the encroaching vegetation has had a good hard winter cut back – sides and height wise.

Phase 2 – A sleeper crossing and hand rail has been installed over the stream that is forming, now you can walk over without having to hop skip and jump.

Phase 3 – STILL UNDER WAY. The side ditches and blocked trenches have been cleared, we are giving the water and wet ground that was immersed a chance to dry out, then the most heavily poached ground is going to be scrapped off and a membrane laid, crushed stone will then be laid to enhance the surface at the worst section. This final phase is scheduled for the next week or 2, depends on rain fall and how well the ground dries out.

Lastly – a new bund will be built on the western entrance to stop the water running off the road and cascading down the lane at pace and causing damage. The previous bund seems to have disintegrated with age and weathering! I am going to clear the issues on ROAM shortly but I think you'll notice a real difference along the route. I hope you are soon able to enjoy this properly again, it's already much improved apart from a small section of heavily poached ground."

Local and Regional Weather Report.

Weather lore for December mostly concerns the weather at Christmas and what this foretells about the New Year. "If Christmas comes during the waxing moon so we should have a very good new year, but "the nearer the New

Moon to Christmas Day, the harder the Winter". "If the sun shines through the apple tree on Christmas Day, there will be an abundant crop in the following year", but "so far as the sun shines on Christmas Day, so far will the snow blow in May". Also on December 21st (Shortest day and St Thomas's day) "look at the weather cock at twelve o'clock, and see which way the wind is, for there it will stick for the next (lunar) quarter". Finally, "If there's thunder during Christmas week, The Winter will be not be meek".





October was generally a gloomy month with a mix of some clear weather and a lot of very wet and windy weather. Later in the month Storm Ashley brought wind and rain. Nearly 8 days out of 10 days saw partly cloudy weather or rain and

only 5 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather. Rainfall: Local 161 mm, Regional 137.4 mm = +13% of normal Minimum temperatures: Local 9 deg, Regional 8.2 deg = +1.0 deg Maximum Temperatures: Local 17 deg, Regional 14.9 deg = +1.2 deg

What are the weather forecasts for December? Met Office says starting settled with overnight frost and daytime fog, probably wetter and windier later with a chance of snow. Netweather forecast is similar.

Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? The weather was fine at Martinmas (10th/11th November), so ducks were swimming and therefore "*at Christmas they will slide*". Jet Stream forecast is across the UK at the start of December, with low pressure and winds from the west. Probably indicates mild but unsettled weather.
