Enmore Parish Council news

First of all, thank you very much to all the public-spirited people who took part in the end of June litter pick, and to the team in the kitchen who made us drinks and gave us cake afterwards. Although we collected a fair amount of rubbish, the overall verdict was that there was slightly less than on previous occasions, which is encouraging.

Your Council met on 2nd July and the draft minutes of this meeting will be available on the website. We discussed signage for the new Cemetery including the community green space, the latter henceforth to be called the Jubilee Meadow. A wooden board has been ordered and will be installed near the gate, also acknowledging the donors who contributed to making the project possible. When the land starts to be used for burials, additional signage, stating Enmore Cemetery and visible from the road, will be commissioned and installed. Your Councillors also discussed the question of access and security. As you may be aware, travellers have encamped in both the Bridgwater and Taunton areas over recent weeks and some have behaved in a menacing fashion. We have been advised that installing a padlock and chain on the gate would mean that inappropriate access would then be deemed forced entry and there would be more redress in these circumstances. The combination for the padlock will be provided to all the donors and will be available to any village resident on request (ask our Clerk, Debbie McIlroy, Fiona Jackson or Andrew Hucker). We ask you not to share this information outside the village in order that this land is available for the enjoyment of Enmore residents (who paid for the land and its improvements) and please take care not to leave the correct combination visible. This policy will be kept under review.

At present the Council website is being maintained on a rather unskilled basis. If there is anyone in the village with relevant IT skills who would be interested in taking on this job, please let Debbie McIlroy or Michael Hopkins know.

Our next scheduled meeting will be on 3rd September but please note that occasionally additional meetings will be called when planning applications have response periods falling between normal meetings.

From **August 1** the shop will have **extended opening hours.**


Mon to Friday from 8 am – to give a chance for you to pick something up on your way to work.

Local and Regional Weather Report



Climate change already seems to be causing average temperatures to rise across the whole world and it will follow, due to melting ice sheets, that sea levels will rise. Somerset has a long history of flooding on the Somerset Levels and also of constructing flood defences. At the moment, work is in progress on the construction of

a tidal barrier on the river Parrett just to the north of Bridgwater, opposite the Express Business Park. The river Parrett flows into the Bristol Channel, which has one of the largest tidal ranges in the world, which in Spring can be up 12.2 metres and the River Parrett experiences a small tidal wave or Bore on tides of over 3.2 metres. The tidal barrier will have gates that can be raised or lowered based on expected tide levels. The barrier will operate both to control the water flowing up stream on a high tide, which could overwhelm flood defences already coping with excessive rainfall and to control water flow downstream to the Bristol Channel, because excessive water flowing downstream can be pushed back upstream by incoming tides. A substantial programme of works to improve existing downstream riverside flood banks and construct new secondary flood banks is also included in the construction project. To lessen the effect on the animal and fish populations, water vole populations have been relocated and there will be improvements to fish and eel passage at 12 upstream sites on both the rivers Parrett and Tone. This will be welcome to conservationists who have recently recorded a small return of eels to the Parrett and to the Rhynes of the Somerset Levels.

Weather lore for August says "If on St. Lawrence's day (August 10th) the weather be fine, fair autumn and good wine". It rained on July 15th (St Swithin's Day), so we are threatened with 40 days of rainy weather but all is not lost, because St Bartholomew may ride to rescue on the 24th. "St. Bartholomew's mantle wipes dry, all the tears that St. Swithin can cry." and even more cheerfully "If the 24th of August be fair and clear, Then hope for a prosperous autumn that year". Finally, August seems to hold the key to winter weather "A fog in August indicates a severe winter and plenty of snow" also "So many August fogs, so many winter mists" and "Be the first week of August warm, then the winter will be white and long."

June was mostly cool and very dry, but towards the end of the month there was a short period of high temperatures. Almost 9 days out of 10 saw sun or sunny intervals and only 5 out of 10 days saw cloud or rain. Local rainfall was recorded at 18 mm, which was much lower than the rest of our region, where rainfall was 35.9 mm and that was only 50% of normal for June. Minimum temperatures were recorded at 8 deg on several nights, which was about the same as the rest of the region, where the average was 9.3 deg and that was 0.1 deg higher than normal for June. The highest day time temperature recorded locally was 30 deg which was higher than the rest of the region, where it was 18 deg and this was 0.4 deg higher than normal.

BBC forecast for June was starting changeable, mild and wet, but maybe warmer and drier later. Netweather forecast was similar. Almost accurate, but not quite. What do they say about August? BBC says generally settled, dry and a little warmer than previous months. Netweather forecast is similar.

Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? No rain on St Medard (June 8th), St Barnabas (June 15th) but rain on St Protis (June 19th) so a wet August. The Jetstream forecast for the beginning of August shows it to the south of the UK with low pressure and westerly winds indicating unsettled weather and cooler than average.

What does “church” actually mean?

To many people the word “church” conjures up pictures of old, musty, cold buildings where a few, perhaps rather strange folk meet on Sundays and perform various rituals which are something of a mystery or possibly a place where the funeral of a loved one has taken place. To others, the word may make people reflect back with some feelings of nostalgia. Church was important to many families; it was somewhere “we” went every Sunday, wearing our best clothes, singing hymns and hearing an older man (usually) talking to us for some time, much of which went over our heads. Or perhaps as children we joined with others to draw pictures and hear Bible stories.

Today church offers a place of quiet, calmness, peace where one might sit quietly for a few minutes and think, reflect or even pray and for some the hymns, prayers and rituals do have a deep and significant meaning.

However, the real meaning of the word church – although mainly understood as a building – actually refers to a group of people who come together to learn, reflect, worship and pray – not necessarily in a building. So being church is something which happens everyday in our communities. People who follow the Christian faith (or indeed some other faiths) live out their beliefs in daily experiences.

Although Jesus taught in the synagogue (a community building) and worshipped on occasion in the temple, the majority of his ministry was amongst and within communities. Read any of the New Testament which recount his life and the miracles he performed, and they were all amongst people in a variety of situations, often outside in the open air. In the nearly five years I have lived in Spaxton and been Associate Priest in the Benefice, I have tried to follow that example. I have probably failed on many occasions, but my motivation is and always has been to bring the love of God out into the community. It is not only me that does this of course and I am frequently surprised and uplifted to see how folk who would not necessarily subscribe to any particular “religion” bring hope, comfort and love to those around them – this is truly following Jesus command to “love one another as I have loved you”.

Our church buildings are there to show that God is still around as a physical presence, but our behaviour is there to show Gods' love as a spiritual reality.

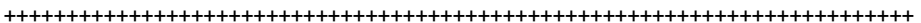


Goodbye Dear Pat

Courgette and Cheese Crumble recipe

If you grow courgettes, you will be familiar with the problem of how to use them when your plants are in full production. This is an excellent stand-alone vegetarian dish or would make a good accompaniment to meat. The recipe is effectively Nigel Slater's from *The Kitchen Diaries* (and his recipe from the same book for Courgette, Feta and Dill "cakes" is also recommended).

Pre-heat oven to 180C or Gas Mark 4.

Chop an onion and soften in butter, add about 1 tablespoon of finely chopped rosemary needles. Scrub potatoes and cut into large dice then add to onion and cover with a lid, cooking gently for about 10 minutes. Chop the courgettes into similar size pieces, add to pan and season with salt and pepper. After another couple of minutes of cooking add about 150ml of stock (or a Knorr concentrated stock pot) and bring to a simmer before assembling the components (time in the oven will complete the cooking).
Crumble: 100g bread, 80g walnut pieces, 60g cheese (Nigel recommends Lancashire but I used Cheddar and no doubt other cheeses will also be fine), plus more rosemary needles. Whizz in a food processor to a fine crumb. Layer the ingredients in an oven-proof dish: first the courgette, onion and potato mixture, then crumble about 45g of cheese on top, then add the topping and press it down gently as you would for a crumble pudding. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes until the top is crisp (official timing - I found that 30 minutes was fine).

The quantities for making the crumble mixture are intended for 4 people and all quantities can be adjusted to suit the number to be fed.

I am delighted to have added this to my courgette repertoire and hope other people will enjoy it too.
