## EDITORIAL - APRIL 2025



## ENMORE MEMORIAL HALL NEWS AND EVENTS

If you are on the village WhatsApp group, you'll have seen the photos of works undertaken at the hall. If not, we're delighted to report that the floor has been



restored, sanded and sealed. Removal of the furniture in the hall and sink unit in the toilets revealed areas of rotten floor planks which have also been replaced. The new sink unit is in situ and further work to 'make good' in the toilets will happen over the next few weeks. Our new chairs are also imminent, so our April Pop-Up Café will be a great opportunity to sit more comfortably and see the transformation.

Many of you will be aware that the roof over the back extension at the hall is leaking and needs replacement. We are seeking quotes

and will be looking for grant opportunities to cover this cost. Our coffers are very depleted, despite the grant from HPC Community fund, with many calls on our funds since the New Year. We are playing catch up to many years of underinvestment in the maintenance of an old building which is not very robustly constructed.

We have also commissioned and paid for a full, independent assessment of, and report on, the Solar PV System. The final report is awaited and we will report back separately as we know this is of particular interest to villagers, particularly those who kindly contributed to their installation.

## **SECRET WORLD NEWS**

#### **Prehistoric Plant**

I love this time of year when the *Magnolia* trees are in full flower before their leaves have started to grow producing such a beautiful display. It's hard to realise that these trees were here in prehistoric times alongside the dinosaurs before the human species existed. This was before insects, butterflies and moths so for pollination this plant relies on the *messy beetle* 





(what a fantastic name!). This beetle feeds on the flowers and gets the pollen on its back which then gets transported to another flower. Amazing how some plants have been in the world around us for millions of years.

We are so lucky that whenever possible the emergency services will help us rescue animals in need. A swan was

spotted perilously close to harm on the railway tracks near Brent Knoll. Thanks to the swift actions of a vigilant train driver, the swan was chased to the side of the tracks, avoiding any immediate danger.

Network Rail quickly responded by dispatching Sam, their Movement Operations Manager, to the scene. Sam met with the Secret World Wildlife Rescue (SWWR) response driver Sharon to assist her in safely finding the swan along the tracks. To ensure everyone's safety, trains were instructed to pass the area in "caution mode" at a speed of 5mph.



Swans do tend to get themselves in silly places and do occasionally land on stretches of roads that can sometimes create a mirage that looks like water. You can see a brave policeman with a swan in the car being brought into us for care. The police aren't always as brave as this because we did go to rescue a swan in Weston-super-Mare one evening, to find the task force in attendance with three policemen keeping a swan cornered with crowd shields. I'm afraid we just got hold of it around the neck, folded its wings and

tucked it under our arms, it was soon in the boot of the car – much to the amusement of the police holding it at bay!

The fire brigade is another service that helps us from deer that have got caught in metal fences, to birds caught with string or fishing line. A tawny owl caught with kite string that was stretched from one tree to another required a turnstile fire engine from



Bristol as there was nowhere to place a ladder to rescue her. Other not so difficult rescues normally just require a long ladder and a brave fireman!

To see a badger rescue on the M5 just before Bristol going north, google M5 badger rescue. The poor badger had been by the fast lane all day until a travelling vet could see it was still alive and contacted us. We very much appreciate all help that our emergency services give us allowing rescues to be safe and successful.

## ENMORE PARISH COUNCIL NEWS www.enmoreparishcouncil.org

Your Parish Council met on 4<sup>th</sup> March and the draft minutes of this meeting are now on the website (a link is on the Meetings page). Since then we have heard that our application for a free defibrillator for Enmore (which we hoped might be placed in or near the church porch) has been unsuccessful. We understand that this is because Enmore already has defibrillators at the Golf Club, at Smocombe Farm and at Cobbs Cross, and that the British Heart Foundation does not consider another one a sufficiently high priority. Also Highways have been asked to provide additional SLOW markings along Enmore Road to support signage in four danger spots.

On 15<sup>th</sup> March Councillors David Comley and Fiona Jackson attended a "Parish Summit" organised by our MP, Sir Ashley Fox, for rural parishes in his constituency. Subjects discussed included flooding/drainage and planning, including how the Government directive on building more new homes will affect planning decisions. David and Fiona attended on behalf of the Parish Council and have reported back to Councillors, who will discuss these topics further at a future meeting. Another benefit from this meeting was information about various useful contacts. However, it appears that lack of funds is likely to limit maintenance of infrastructure - it is up to us all to take some initiative.

There is no planned Parish Council meeting in April, but May will be a busy month, with a routine meeting on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> May (starting at 7.30 pm) preceded by the Annual Parish Meeting at 7.15 pm (to appoint the Chairman). In addition, the Parish Assembly will be held on 20<sup>th</sup> May, starting at 7.30 pm. All these meetings will be held in Enmore Memorial Hall.

The current financial year for Local Government, including parish councils, ends on 31<sup>st</sup> March. Final accounts for the year will be available in early April and will be posted on the Finance page of the website. And the various Annual Return forms will be prepared ready for Council to approve them (we hope!) at their 6th May meeting.

## SAFER ENMORE ROAD INITIATIVE feedback from a village survey

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At the Enmore Memorial Hall pop up cafe in March, we asked attendees to complete a short survey to inform our Safer Enmore Road initiative. This is a collaborative effort to find ways to ensure Enmore Road is safer for nonmotorised users such as those walking, cycling, riding, and running. We all believe this has become more of a concern in recent years as levels of traffic seem to have increased.

We had 21 surveys completed so a huge thanks to everyone who agreed to participate. 20 surveys represented the views of people living in Enmore with 1 being a visitor. Most respondents stated that they walked along roads in the village, with 3 also cycling and 5 horse riding.

Everyone was asked to score the extent to which they feel safe when using the road. 33% said they feel safe most of the time but 52% felt unsafe with 15% not really thinking about it. This has given us the confidence there is a need for this initiative.

81% of respondents said they considered the time of day before they used the road, with the main consideration being to avoid the school run or rush hour. We were pleased to learn that 57% would most likely use hi-viz, although 19% said only sometimes and 24% never. Just one of the respondents used a recording device and one had reported an incident to the police, and another had reported to the British Horse Society.

In addition to the statistics above, there were some helpful comments and ideas for making Enmore Road safer, which were mainly around reducing the speed of cars and installing more road markings to slow traffic.

We are already in discussion with the Parish Council, and you will notice a mirror has been installed on the Tynte Pub opposite Frog Lane, thanks to kind permission from Pete. This is a trial and will be reviewed before any more are introduced. The horse-riding warning signs are also in progress and hopefully more improvements to follow – watch this space!

This month's old Somerset weather lore says that "If it rains on Easter Sunday (20<sup>th</sup> April) it will rain on every Sunday till Whitsuntide and "If the first three days of April be foggy, there will be a flood in June". Also "A cow with its tail to the west, makes weather the best; A cow with its tail to the east, makes weather the least". Bad weather in April should please the farmers with "A cold April the barn will fill" and "If it thunders on All Fools' Day, It brings good crops of corn and hay". Birds also feature in folklore with "When there are many more swifts than swallows in the Spring, expect a hot and dry Summer" and gardening advice "When you hear the Cuckoo shout It's time to plant the tatties out". Check the wind direction first, but "if you hear the cuckoo sing on St Tiburtius day (14<sup>th</sup> April), for good luck, turn over all your money, spit and do not look at the ground". Finally good news "March winds and April showers, Bring forth May flowers"

**February** started unsettled with wintry showers and this was followed by a period of heavy rain with some local flooding, but mild temperatures. The month ended with widespread fog and frost. More than 7 days out of 10 days saw cloudy weather or rain and only 5 days out of 10 saw sunny or partly sunny weather.

**Rainfall**: Local 64 mm, Regional 98.6 mm = +3% of normal **Minimum Temperatures**: Local 2°, Regional 3° = +1.7° **Maximum Temperatures**: Local 12°, Regional 8.1° = +1.2°

What is the weather forecast for **April**? Long range forecasts say unsettled with extended periods of rainy and windy weather. Some brighter and colder periods. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? No thunder in February so no frost in April, but watch out for an east wind on Lady-Day (March 25th) which will keep in till the end of May. Jet Stream forecast at the start of February shows it across the UK and low pressure with winds from the south east. Probably mild, and unsettled with periods of rain.

# WILDING AT GOATHURST

## Bird nesting boxes, owls and seats!

In liaison with the Quantock Landscape Partnership Scheme, two bird nesting boxes have been sited in churchyard trees. They were made by The Men's Shed, Bridgwater, and painted by Class 5 pupils at Enmore school during their lunch breaks.



Following the felling of the storm damaged fir tree, Gary Orange (wood carver) was commissioned to create a back-to-back seat from the unsightly stump. It features the Christian message of 'Love, Hope, Joy and Peace' and was grant aided by the Parish Council.



Gary used some of the wood from the tree to carve ten owls which he kindly donated to be sold for church funds. He has since sold 4 more and will be carving more animals from the wood which will be on sale at events later in the year.



Partnership and teamwork are the key

themes linking these projects and Goathurst PCC is hugely grateful to all who gave of their time and skills to enhance our environment.

#### To Somerset and Halswell House

#### Thursday July 16th 1896

I went to Taunton Horse Show with the Kemeys-Tyntes and I doubt whether I shall ever have a similar experience but, much as I love old customs and tradition felt that our mode of progress was an anachronism. I only wish it were not so and that I lived in the days when such experiences were a matter of course. The Kemeys-Tyntes drove in a delightful "turn out" with postillions in powdered wigs, hunting caps and old postillion liveries of blue and silver. The Tyntes gave a lunch at the Castle. It is very noticeable that men, who are indifferent riders and whose horses refuse on that account, always beat them.

On Sunday Charlie and I had great fun hunting rabbits with his beagle: he on a horse and myself on a donkey. In Millwood are a series of lakes connected by waterfalls. At the head of one is a large statue of Neptune. Neptune had to be "done up" some time ago and the village painter sent in his bill "To Repair Nepkin 9/-".

I slept in the Chintz room. It has a very beautiful ceiling and an extremely good parquet floor. Over the door is a portrait of Charles the First and over the mantlepiece a fine portrait of a Lady Tynte. These two seem very interested in your movements. Their eyes follow you wherever you go. Charles the First looking with disdain at the wretched 19th century mortal as he takes off his sombre uninteresting dress suit, no doubt wondering how mankind has ever come to dress in such an extraordinary manner. With Lady Tynte it is most embarrassing. She watches intently everything you do. I almost felt inclined to pull the curtains of the great four post bedstead and get into my pyjamas behind them. As I got into bed I thought what a good setting it would be for a ghost. In the small hours of the morning I was awakened by what seemed to me, when half awake, an extraordinary noise. It sounded like a troop of phantom Cavalry charging across the park and halting under the very windows of the house. I jumped out of bed and looked out and saw a herd of deer just beyond the sunk fence.

Somerset Buller made rather a smart retort to Charlie Kemeys-Tynte the other day. Buller who had just become engaged to Rosamund Lindsay, was sitting with her on the terrace. Charlie went round several times and interrupted their confidences. The last time he went he said, "Don't you find the sun rather trying?" "Yes," answered Buller, "the son of the house."

#### August 12th 1896

I lunched with the Kemeys-Tyntes and then drove over with "Babe" Tynte and Miss Lloyd to a garden p[arty at the Bouveries at Brymore and then dined and slept at Halswell. We had a most amusing evening. Eustace Kemeys-Tynte, Charlies younger brother was staying there too. He is a most extraordinary boy and cares nothing for anyone. Mr. Brice the parson at Goathurst was asked to dine. He is the butt of all and is certainly a most foolish old man. Before dinner I was taken up to him and introduced as Lord Cadogan, the son of the Duke of Sutherland, the introduction being by Dadums, as Eustace is called. "Proud to meet you, my Lord," said poor old Brice. He was different to one parson who was at Goathurst in the days of "the bad Colonel Tynte." The latter would not allow the service in the church to commence before he had arrived. He was late one Sunday and the parson waited and then commenced the service with 'when the wicked man turneth away,' then he paused and added 'I see that he has not come yet.'

It is told of this Kemeys-Tynte, that being heavily in debt, bailiffs came to serve him with writs, but some of the tenants patrolled the park entrances and looked so dangerous that the bailiffs returned to London. However old Brice ate sugar with his savoury plentifully administered by Dadums who assured him everyone took it. Afterwards in the billiard room, the whisky and soda of a neighbour who shall be nameless was doctored by Dadums. This gentleman, who prides himself on his dignity, was so funny in his attempts to walk straight and speak intelligently that we almost hurt ourselves in an endeavour to restrain our laughter. Finally we saw him off, muttering against the darkness of the night, his lantern held close to the ground, back foremost so that the light shone out behind.

It reminds me of a story of another man, who having dined too well, insisted on walking home. The following morning he received a note from his host. "If you will be good enough to send me back my birdcage, I will return you your lantern."

The Kemeys-Tyntes have a large property in Wales, named Cefn Mably, originally the home of the Kemeys family. The Kemeys heiress married a Tynte and this property has been in the Kemeys family for six hundred years. In the Civil War there was fighting round the house and the Kemeys buried the dead Roundheads under the stone flags at the entrance. Cefn is supposed to be haunted and many people swear to having seen or heard alleged ghosts. The Cefn Mably property is about 30,000 acres but the shooting is hopeless on account of the proximity of the mines, it being almost impossible to cope with the poaching.

The next day we played cricket against Bridgwater. Sammy Woods, the captain of the Somerset eleven playing for us and staying the night. At midday we had the venison lunch, to which the tenants come annually. One curious old custom obtained at Halswell. The Kemeys-Tyntes always give the coffins to the villagers when any of them die. We play cricket every week at Halswell, and it is great fun. Halswell Tynte always calls me the Kinsman. He is a great gourmet and the cuisine is wonderful. One day at about two hours' notice he asked the whole eleven to come into dinner, and a meal was served which would have been good at the best restaurant in London.

## WILDLIFE MATTERS

Almost exactly a year ago we were intrigued to see a Mistle Thrush in our garden, not just once, but on several occasions. Shortly after it was joined by another, clearly, they were a pair, the male often sitting in a high tree on the

boundary just observing. We then saw the female collecting sticks from the ground just outside our back window. We were further amazed on 16<sup>th</sup> March to find that she had built a nest about 2m high between a timber pergola and our dining room wall about 1.5m from our back door!



After a week or so, when she was not on the nest, I sneaked a photo. One beautiful egg. After a few days we had a total of four eggs. By 11<sup>th</sup> April, three had hatched. One egg appeared to have been





pushed out of the nest, just over the edge. The hatchlings, like most baby birds, are not the most attractive of creatures! Meanwhile Dad was keeping



a beady eye on the whole garden. We saw him actually see off a sparrowhawk! Eventually they all fledged.



We aren't getting too excited, but we have seen two Mistle Thrushes around the garden again a few days ago. They are now quite rare and on the red list, also are usually shy. How lucky we are! Tony and Jane Eggar
