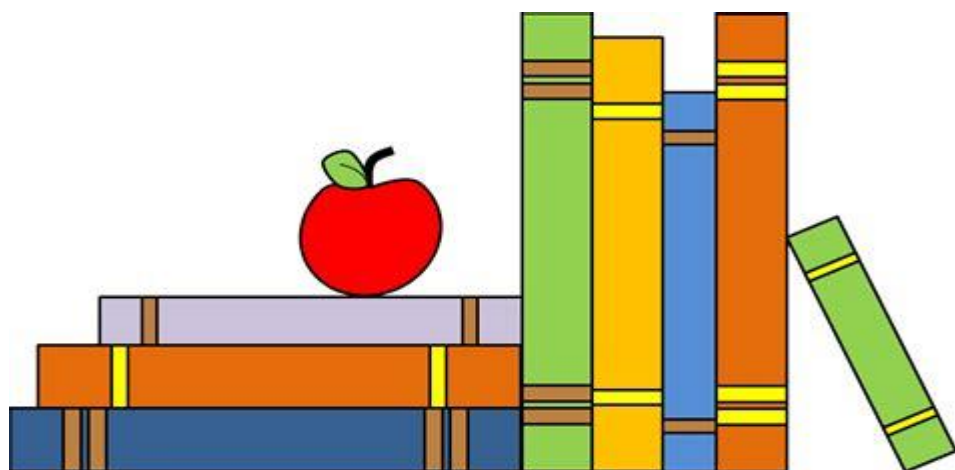

We should relish and respect our rich local history, both of Bridgwater itself and its surrounding area.

In 1607, Bridgwater (or, to be more accurate, the Bristol Channel) had its own tsunami, originating south of Ireland. More modern explanations suggest that it wasn't a tsunami but a massive wave surge coinciding with a spring tide. The resulting wall of water

funnelled due west into the mouth of the Bristol Channel and raced along the north and south banks of the channel. On meeting the Brean Down peninsular part of the wave surge was diverted onto the Somerset levels, demolishing the sea defences, deeply flooding the small settlement of Burnham-on-Sea and subsequently reaching Glastonbury. The whole of the land referred to as the Somerset levels was covered in water. At the time it was the largest human disaster ever recorded with 2000 dead. Out on the levels there are stories of whole families having to climb trees and stay there for up to three days, with the weakest drowning as hunger, fatigue and the March cold took their toll. Even in those days this area was valued and fertile farming land and it must have had a catastrophic effect on many farmers and their animals.

Closer to home at West Bower Manor, apparently there was a happy event in 1508. A baby girl, Jane Seymour, was born. Jane later became the third wife of Henry VIII. Jane gave the king his longed-for son, Edward, but Jane died just seven days later from complications of childbirth. For 500 years this royal connection gave pleasure but inevitably there have been recent attempts to discredit this story, just like the tsunami. I stick with the original!

Local and Regional Weather Report



We are currently experiencing probably the hottest and driest summer in living memory and also in the history of Somerset and of the UK. The following are some ideas from the past on how to predict the start of some desperately needed rain. The Shepherd of Banbury's Rules from 1744 say that Moonrise

occurring in the early evening brings fair weather, but a halo around the moon means bad weather is coming. The smaller the halo, the more likely there will be rain and if there are stars in the halo, then it will rain for as many days as there are stars. The Rules also say when the wind comes from the South for two or three Days, and it grows very hot, and you see clouds with great white tops like towers, then there will be thunder and rain suddenly. Weather lore from this period also says that before a storm, church bells can be heard from distant parishes and the leaves of oaks and poplars will turn over to show their undersides.

July was hot and dry with almost no rain and drought conditions. There were above average temperatures and almost continuous heatwave conditions. Every day saw sunny or partly sunny weather, and only 2 days out of 10 saw cloudy weather and only 1 day a had a small amount of rain.

Rainfall: Local 4 mm, Regional 1.5 mm = 7.9 mm below normal

Minimum Temperatures: Local 11°, Regional 13.2° = +2.1°

Maximum Temperatures: Local 32°, Regional 24.9° = +5.5°

What is the weather forecast for September? Met Office says likely to be dry settled weather, with above average temperatures and a chance of heatwaves. Can we add any more from the weather lore forecast? August 10th (St Lawrence) was sunny, so it should be a “fair autumn and good wine”. The Jetstream forecast for the beginning of September shows it to the north of the UK, which means that warm air will be drawn from the south, so likely warm and dry in the UK.

Notice Regarding the Lack of Rain in Goathurst

We are considering starting classes in Cherokee Rain Dance in Goathurst, to which residents of Enmore will be very welcome. They will be particularly suitable for older residents as they only require small jerky movements in a zigzag pattern. St Edward's Church, Goathurst, has a new organ!

As many of you will know, for some years the old organ had been temperamental and out of date. Many of you will also have been aware of the keyboard set up, kindly loaned by Michael Hopkins of Enmore, as a temporary solution.

Having taken advice re the best specification to meet our needs and setting, we have acquired a new digital organ at a cost of £10,500. We were able to make use of the offer of interest free loan with a deposit of £4,500 and interest free repayments of £125 over the next 4 years.

The PCC's organ fund (augmented by Colin's generosity over the years) funded the deposit and holds sufficient to cover fifteen months of repayments. This includes donations from the legacies of Sheila and Harold Punch and Bill Ingles.

This purchase is a leap of faith as, going forward, we need to raise funds for the remainder. We propose holding a musical evening to include an organ recital in the near future and specific donations would also be very much appreciated.

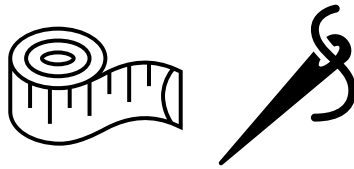
THANK YOU

RIGHTS OF WAY AROUND ENMORE

1. **Bridleways** – I happened to bump into Tina of the White Linen Cleaning Co on “Cruel Hill” last Friday and we got chatting about the state of Bridleway BW15.20/21. Almost immediately (thanks to WhatsApp) she had arranged a whole lot of volunteers to clear this beautiful right of Way, which can be accessed from the bottom of Cruel Hill, Tirelands Lane or Secret Valley. Now hopefully, more riders and walkers will use this path to avoid the dangers of Enmore Road. It used to be a quagmire of mud and impassable, but Broomfield Warden Glyn Edwards organised its clean up in 2024 and since then I have used it regularly.
2. **Diversion Order for Bridleway BW4/20** (subject to a statutory 4 week consultation period, which expired 29/01/2025). This will open up a new route from Broomfield Hall Road (Cruel Hill) just above BW15/20 mentioned in 1 above, which has been inaccessible for many, many years and brings one out on the Cobbs Cross Track. I will enquire when work will start on this Right of Way. Work is currently delayed.
3. **Footpaths** – Because of the recent heatwaves, walking the trails is better than ever, so I want to encourage all of you to try off-road walks. Thank you to Andrew Hucker for telling me that routes had been cleared across some of the large fields behind Enmore School, where it is possible to do a circular walk to Barford round the Lake. And several people have asked me to show them the routes. So, before it starts raining (hopefully), please contact me and, inspired by Tina, I will arrange to show you alternate walking routes,



4. I did the circular walk referred to in 3 above last week and took some photos. Just a lovely afternoon. But I will give guidance as I'm not sure if it was the Ramblers or the landowners who cut paths through the maize and whether the new routes are those on the Explore Map.



(i) Walked Church Lane to road outside School and through foot path gate and turned left for the kissing gate on Path BW:15/8.

(ii) Then bear right on the perimeter path until you reach the cut path across the maize to the next field by a permanent open gate.

(iii) Bear right on the perimeter again until you reach another cut path across the maize, which brings you to a little bridge to the left across a gully (see photo).

(iv) Cross the bridge and walk left on the perimeter avoiding the pile of muck to Barford white gates.

(v) Join BW15/7 and when you get to BW15/8 and after climbing a

stile there is another wall of maize, proceed to the left along the perimeter where you come to another cut path across the maize.

(vi) Walk towards the Castle keeping to the path until you get to Church Lane.

5 Strimmers - Thank you to all those who have cleared paths – Sedgemoor Ramblers, Luke Manning, Landowners, Horse Riders and Hikers. Their efforts are sincerely appreciated. And remember to report issues to the Warden through the Explore Map.
